Commodore's Corner

For the benefit of those who were unable to attend this year's AGM. below is my address:

From the Helm

2017 was a very unique weather year; the high water levels proved to be a bit challenging but we were able to keep our launch schedule on task and carry on despite the challenges. Although the high water was a bit of extra work for the crew, they were fantastic at keeping the marina going through the whole thing.

The service kiosk got a makeover after the water levels receded, which included a new roof, flooring, trim and exterior paint!

There was a small decrease in transient boaters (120 compared to 150-200 as in previous years) but still a great number considering some marinas around the lake did not launch this year. There were no issues with the reciprocal program. Everyone was welcomed and seemed to enjoy their time at CBM.

We welcomed a new crew member this year - James Duquet (*Phyxius*). He was a great asset as he is a master diver and was able to help repair the chains and keep the docks in good working order. We replaced just under 1500 ft of chain! James also dove to inspect the clubhouse (see the attached report) Last year we purchased a hot water, high-pressure washer and offered a washing/waxing/ detailing service. Bill Amirault has been instrumental in providing these new services to customers who either don't have the time to do the work themselves or who can't do it any more. This new initiative has gone very well and we will continue offering it.

The service dock was expanded from 60 to 80 ft providing space for two boats to be docked at the same time.

As well, to reduce the slope when water levels go down in the fall, the crew rebuilt A dock's ramps and, for increased safety, added handrails.

We welcomed many new marina customers this past season, many of whom have joined the yacht club. We have received a lot of positive feedback from them. They are enjoying the social aspect and the new friendships they are making. Great job to the executive for all they have done to welcome the new members! We truly believe in the great relationship between the marina and yacht club and are very excited for the future.

We continue fighting the airport expansion. We have some upcoming court dates and pre-hearing dates at both the federal and provincial levels. We believe in this cause. We know we have a strong case and we will continue this fight to protect the marina. We truly thank you all for your support.

This winter we are continuing the dock repairs and we will be upgrading the washrooms. We have been working with Bell to bring fiber to the marina to be able to provide a reliable wifi service.

Collins Bay Marina has been awarded GOLD in Kingston's Readers' Choice Awards. We are very humbled by this award and appreciate the support.

We are looking forward to 2018! The Collins Bay community is amazing and we are proud to be a part of it!

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Blast from the Past

For many of us, our clubhouse, the S.S. Maria, has always been a part of our Collins Bay Marina/Collins Bay Yacht Club experience. Let's go back in time to see how it evolved from an idea to our social gathering place.

The first clubhouse "Northern Lights", an old houseboat, was donated to the club by Bill Steenbakkers in 1981. Northern Lights remained on land and served the club for the next ten years. Due to age and



deterioration it had become unsafe and needed to be replaced. The roof was leaking

and the floor was rotting out.

During the summer of 1991 Hub Steenbakkers made an offer to build and provide a floating platform on which the club could build a clubhouse. He would build a large (approx. 20' x 40') steel floating platform consisting of steel pontoons similar to those used for the floating docks.

At a special meeting of the executive on 10 June 1991 CBYC accepted the offer and created Finance and Building Committees to implement the plan. The Finance Committee was responsible for raising sufficient funds to allow successful completion of the project within the time frame.




