TORONTO INTERNATIONAL BOAT SHOW 2018

While the Fenderheads may have abandoned the organization of a motor coach to ferry CBYC faithful to TIBS this year, a number of folks still made the annual pilgrimage nonetheless. Maybe it was to escape past, there were the residual effect of the grinding Christmas cold, kick some 'tires' or to products than ever. This socialize with their mates. Regardless, all found a packed Enercare Centre full to overflowing with opportunities to lighten their wallets.

The Commodore (CoCB) and the First Lady of Collins Bay (FLoCB), along with Panacea sailors Dave and Shelly Nickerson. made the trek via train on Friday 12 Jan. 2018. Later in the day, Shimmer stewards Andrew and Wendy Hope tried to catch-up on the 'peoples airline' only to find the adverse weather significantly disrupted the planned schedule. All was forgiven the following morning, when we boarded the shuttle to TIBS.

Upon arrival, we were treated to a veritable smorgasbord of exhibits. As has been the case in previous years, there was a heavy emphasis on power boats of all kinds and cottage life. Having said that, there was still lots of material for the old and new salts alike. Perhaps more importantly, we even ran into Louis Gagnon and Stacey Jones of Stolen Moments, Jim Beliveau and Helen



The evening started at the bar with introductions and drinks. The group of almost twenty then moved into one of the meeting rooms, and once settled in, eagerly started sharing with one another.


The "secrets" covered many aspects of cruising:

- apparel (e.g. <u>merino wool</u> and <u>bamboo</u>)
- favourite cookbooks
- food prep (e.g. cooking rice in a thermos while underway; using parchment paper in small spaces as a cooking prep work surface which can then be thrown away)

- courses (consensus was that all courses are an asset)
- YouTube videos (e.g. Sailing Doogles), Sailing SV Delos, Sailing La Vagabonde)
- safety (e.g. not going to shore wearing apparel with your boat name; place reflective tape on boat mast to easily identify your boat when returning after dark; snorkeling wearing a red beanie or a flag to be visible)
- and more

Blast from the Past

Going across the lake, to visit the US side can be an exciting adventure on its own. **But sometimes Mother** Nature decides to make the adventure even more exciting. Here's a story that was published in the September 1994 issue of the Collins Mixer titled Cape Vincent Saga.

If we hadn't been in Cape Vincent during the storm on Aug 4, we wouldn't have met all those nice, helpful people. At least that's the way to look at the experience positively.

We'd had a great cruise for nearly two weeks, but other boats had gone home and only ZOOM and SUENO were left. We heard the forecast for storms and wind changes, so ran for Cape Vincent as a safe harbor and obtained berths at Anchor Marina.

ZOOM tied up at the eastern end of the wall, and SUENO just west of the' jog' in the wall, both facing the southwest wind. The storm hit passed, with Gordon helping about five PM with torrential rain and winds of 55 knots, more or less. At one point, a 40 foot sailboat, with anchor dragging and no engine, was bearing down

on SUENO, but the wind took it about 30 feet further on where it rode up on the jetty for about 3 feet, then fell back in the water. Gordon (ZOOM) and some other men got it alongside and secured to the jetty.

The storm seemed to pass in about an hour, but the wind remained at 30 to 40 knots. It was ZOOM's turn to cook dinner, which was enjoyed by all except the hostess, who kept disappearing to the Jetty to escape the boat movement.

After checking the lines we retired for the night. About midnight, we were wakened by the boat being thrown against the jetty. On the jetty, we met ZOOM who said he would have to move or lose his boat. With help from the people on the jetty, a bit of luck, and masterful seamanship, ZOOM got away from the jetty and eventually alongside at the west side of the Fisheries dock.

SUENO was boxed in by the jog in the jetty, by another boat ahead, and the north wind, so it was decided we had to stay and put lines out to pull us off the jetty, well that is, only hitting every seventh wave. Several hours others, Merv checking the lines every five minutes, and Ann and Marion worrying about their men.

About five AM, SUENO started to

hit bottom as well as the jetty. The wind had veered to the NE and when the boat dropped into the trough of a wave, there was not enough water to stay afloat. Nothing for it, we had to move. Woke ZOOM. Ann took Brandy, Gordon held the bow until the last second, and with more masterful seamanship, also luck, SUENO was out in the harbor. With lots of help, we managed to get SUENO alongside the jetty on the west side of the big marina shed, in a space slightly longer than the boat. The wind continued until midafternoon when it calmed down to about 10 knots. The rest of the day was spent trying to catch up on sleep.

Saturday, we both motored back to Collins Bay -- NO WIND!


