What about fractional ownership?

You should read this excellent post on the <u>iNavx</u> blog:

'Fractional ownership is the idea that you buy a stake in a boat to share with someone else, then you share ownership expenses and usage of the boat. It's not a new concept – friends and family have been sharing ownerships as partners for years. What is newer is the idea of a third party management company setting up a partnership with strangers.'

What it is not

Fractional ownership isn't like a timeshare – you own an actual piece of the boat, whereas in a time-share you own a right to use the underlying asset but don't own it.

It isn't a charter. Though some charter companies offer fractional ownership in charter boats, you will own your share of the boat. In the cast of charter companies, they will charter the boat when the owners aren't using it.'

Smoke from the Sailing School

Since being confirmed by the CBYC Board of Directors (BoD) as Co-Directors of the Sailing School (SS), Dave and I have been working hard to learn the portfolio and put in place what is required to ensure success this coming sail training season.

To this end, we have had extensive discussions with former SS Directors Richard Dickson and Ian Banville, former SS Operations Manager Mark Sansom, SS Administrator Darlene Amirault, Head Instructor Jayna Mandin, Kingston Yacht Club among others.

We believe we have made progress on the SS Operations Manager front but we will share more news on this matter a little later.

CANSail 1-4 will be offered again this sail training season. Thanks to Darlene Amirault and Mark Sansom, on-line registrations were opened 13 January 2024 and we already have 30+ berths filled of the approximately 112 available over the 4 sessions. We have elected to increase the fees again this year by \$75 to better cover our expenses including instructor/coaches wage increases as well as inflationary pressures on SS equipment and supplies.

Insofar as SS equipment is concerned, we have purchased a console for our Highfield CL₃₁₀

and with the timely assistance and skill of Jean Harvey, we expect to have this kit installed and splashed this spring.

As soon as the snow melts, we will be inspecting the learn-to-sail fleet to baseline our inventory in order to map out a plan for their cyclical replacement.

Key dates on this year's SS calendar include:

- Session 1: 1-12 July
- Session 2: 15-26 July
- Session 3: 29 July 9 Aug.
- Session 4: 12-23 Aug.
- End of Season BBQ: 24 Aug.

1 in 10,000 mile risk of injury cruising

A recent study published in the medical journal Wilderness and Environmental Medicine asked cruising sailors whether they have ever been injured, and the results suggest the fewer than 1 in 5 cruising voyages result in any kind of injury.

568 respondents, of which 217 were women and 351 men, with an age of just over 36 years.

Of the 793 cruising trips reported, 141 resulted in injury, which is 18%.

The most frequent injury types were contusion (40%) and skin lesions and lacerations (20%); while the most frequently injured body parts were hands (28%) feet and ankles (18%).

Perhaps unsurprisingly, the most frequent ways of getting injured were tripping/falling (33%), being hit by an object (19%) and using ropes (19%).

Cruising sailors reported inattention/being distracted as the biggest perceived risk factor (34%), followed by difficult weather conditions (22%) and fatigue/lack of sleep (14%).

Wind-powered coffee sails to Sherbrooke

Sherbrooke's Café William is expecting its first shipment of sailboat coffee any day now... and has just equipped itself with an electric roaster, a world first on an industrial scale.

The very first sailing cargo of coffee for Sherbrooke roaster Café William left Colombia on December 18, the culmination of several years of efforts by the company to reduce its greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions.

<u>The Avontuur</u>, a 43-meter schooner, left the port of Santa Marta with the equivalent of four containers of green coffee on board, Café William president and CEO Rémi Tremblay told La Presse.

"We want to participate in the industry's transformation," he enthuses, acknowledging the heavy carbon footprint of coffee when consumed in our latitudes.

US\$ 0.10: Average cost of transporting a pound of coffee by motorized cargo ship.

US\$ 0.30: Average cost of shipping a pound of coffee by sailboat.

TECH CORNER

After one season using my Torqeedo <u>1103</u> electric engine for my inflated dinghy, I am sharing with you my impressions as promised:

- * Easy to manipulate the body because it is lighter compare to my previous 5HP
- * The battery is big enough but I would like to have another one as a backup
- It takes the whole night to recharge the battery on my 12v house system
- * The autonomy varies depending of the wind, waves and the load (how many passengers)
- # I like the fact of not having to carry gaz and not changing oil at the end of the season.
- * It always starts, with instant torque.
- * No noise, no smell (exhaust)
- * The integrated GPS calculates the autonomy so I can adjust my speed to the distance desired
- # I have to carry the battery with me if I go for an ice cream at Stella (safety) because the battery is around 1000\$
- * Less powerful than my previous 5HP Honda

Overall I recommend it specially for short distances like us with our dog...

Gilles on Garuda

Italian Sausage Orzo Soup (One-Pot 30-Minutes)



Ingredients

- 15 oz spicy Italian sausage crumbled
- I teaspoon Italian seasoning or Herbs from Provence
- · fresh thyme to taste
- red pepper flakes to taste
- I cup orzo uncooked
- 8 oz portobello mushrooms (2 big mushroom caps chopped)
- 4 cloves garlic minced
- 5 cups chicken stock
- 5 oz fresh spinach
- ½ cup heavy cream

Instructions

Add crumbled Italian sausage, Italian seasoning, a generous amount of fresh thyme (no sprigs, just leaves), and red pepper flakes to a large saucepan. Cook. on medium heat, regularly stirring to break the sausage.

Once the sausage released juices and is half cooked, add I cup of uncooked orzo, chopped portobello, and minced garlic, and cook, constantly stirring, for about 3 minutes on medium heat until portobello mushrooms soften but are not cooked through.

Add 5 cups of chicken stock, stir everything well, cover with the lid, bring to a boil, and cook for about 5 or 10 minutes until the orzo is cooked.

Add spinach to the soup, cover with the lid and let it wilt on low heat, occasionally stirring.

Once the spinach has wilted, remove the soup from the heat and add heavy cream. Stir everything and season with salt and pepper. Add more red pepper flakes, if you like. Top with fresh thyme.
