Their connection was like no other, and they will forever be best friends. Lets talk with chatGPT

Gilles: I recently sailed on a Oceanis 46 and the specification mentioned 'Design Category A, B, C or D'. What does it means?

ChatGPT: Ah, the Design Category! It's like the report card for boats. The letters (A, B, C, D) represent different levels of seaworthiness and the conditions the boat is designed for:

Category A: Ocean - Can handle rough seas and strong winds. Ready to tackle the big, open waters.

Category B: Offshore - Good for being off the beaten path, but not venturing too far from land. Think coastal cruising.

Category C: Inshore - Perfect for sheltered waters, bays, and lakes. Not the adventurer type, but great for a calm day on the water.

Category D: Sheltered waters - Designed for lakes, rivers, and other protected areas. Not one to take on the high seas.

So, the Oceanis 46 being Category A means it's ready to face the big blue and handle some serious ocean adventures. Quite the seaworthy vessel, I must say!

THE CARBON COST OF SAILING

'New research reaches some surprising conclusions about which propulsion systems might actually have the lowest carbon footprint. Theo Stocker digs into the numbers.

A white sail on a blue sea. What could be cleaner than that?' Sailing nerds might recognize this quote from the all-time greatest sailing film, Wind. Or maybe that's just me. Anyway, it's easy to assume that drifting around with the breeze has little impact on the environment, let alone the global climate.

Certainly, the marine industry is tiny compared to other emitters of greenhouse gases, but it still registers on the scale. Recreational boats account for less than 0.1% of global greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions, specifically 0.7% of transportation carbon dioxide (CO2) emissions in the United States and 0.4% of transportation CO2 emissions in Europe. Those numbers sound small, but then consider that there are estimated to be 50 million recreational craft globally, with as many as one million new boats being added to that number every year.

New research has now been published by the International Council of Marine Industry Associations (ICOMIA) as they seek to plot a way forwards for the leisure marine industry. The rather bleak headline is that if you want to move away from fossil fuel propulsion, you could easily generate a larger rather than smaller carbon footprint, whether you're looking at biofuels, hydrogen, electric or hybrid propulsion systems.

The good news, however, is that the devil is in the detail. Make a few compromises to things like range and performance, conduct an honest appraisal of how you actually use your boat, and utilise new and emerging technologies, and you can reduce your boat's carbon footprint, whether you're buying a new boat or NOT.'

TECH CORNER

I am currently installing and I recommended to many of my friends to install in their boat a CERBO GX from Victron Energy.

'This is a little computer and a communication-centre allowing you to always have perfect control over your system in your boat from wherever you are and maximises its performance. Simply connect through the internet <u>Victron Remote Management</u> (VRM) portal, or access directly, using the separate GX Touch screen, a MFD or the VictronConnect App thanks to its built-in WiFi Access Point.

It combines all the best of connectivity, redefining smart power solutions in every way.



Instantly monitor the battery state of charge, power consumption, power harvest from PV, generator, and mains, or check tank levels and temperature measurements. Easily control the shore power input current limit, (auto)start/stop generator(s) or change any setting to optimise the system. Follow up on alerts, perform diagnostic checks and resolve challenges remotely.

The Cerbo GX maximises the performance of your VE systems components in real-time and keeps them in perfect tune. With its Dual Core Processor and the addition of an extra CAN-bus port you can now support even bigger systems; closely follow managed (lithium) LFP batteries while the second port can support many simultaneously connected VE.Can solar chargers. The new NMEA 2000-out support has the GX easily integrated into any boats network. Four tank- and four temperature ports as well as 3 VE.Direct ports, 3 USB ports, 4 digital inputs and 2 relays allow you to expand control to a new level.

The Cerbo GX serves endless purposes, extending perfect control to the most diverse applications. For solutions including generators, such as Marine, it will auto-start/stop your generator, or delays ignition until the end of 'quiet' periods.'

I will follow-up with you about my installation on Garuda where I will connect it to my BMV712 shunt meter and my Smart MPPT.

I have plans for my Cerbo GX in the future like connecting my tank meters, some temperature/ humidity sensors for winter monitoring from home and more.
